Rationale	The field of applied social sciences is a profession that inherently works with people, bringing with them the possibility of a variety of ethical issues. It is essential, therefore, for social sciences students to possess frameworks with which to engage key ethical decisions and dilemmas. Students are required to have a good grasp of applicable ethical frameworks, legal and compliance issues, policies, key ethical principles and decision making models that will aid them to competently engage with complex ethical considerations and dilemmas and achieve well-founded ethical decisions in their professional practice. In addition, professional issues including membership of professional bodies and organisations, industry standards, professional networking, professional development and self-care for the Applied Social Sciences practitioner will be discussed.
