Rationale	This unit gives students the opportunity to develop a literature review and begin to explore research questions while considering an area of personal or professional interest related to their discipline. In the development of a literature review a student may well be better equipped to understand the themes developing in a particular area of applied social sciences. It will also build towards a more solid foundation for future research and also preparation for SO394 Extended Self Directed Project. This unit thereby adds both breadth and depth to a student's program of study, as well as increases their options for future employment in specialised areas of research and practice.
