Rationale	Christian 'ministry' is commissioned to all believers, who through the empowerment of the Holy Spirit and loving service to God, minister to the church and the wider community in fulfilment of God's mission and mandate which He began in Christ (Matt 28:19-20; Acts 1:1-8; Mark 12:30-31; Eph 4:12; 2 Cor 5:18-20).		
	In order for such ministry to be faithfully and responsibly discharged an accurate understanding of the premises and precepts which form the theological basis for ministry are required. Such precepts arise out of a profound vision of who God is, His character, His nature and His purposes. Likewise, in order to outwork ministry according to such a vision an incarnation of these theological premises and divine attributes are required within the faith, belief systems, character and nature of the minister of God. This unit sets forth foundational aspects for the formation of a theology of ministry from rich prevailing thought patterns of biblical and historical truths as the basis of ministry praxis in contemporary society. This core unit contributes to establishing foundational knowledge and Christian belief in order to provide a framework for the student's theological, personal and ministry formation and practice.
