Rationale	Mental health in Australia is rapidly becoming one of the major social issues of our time. With research showing that one in five people will experience some kind of mental health issue every year (SA) (E, 2014), the reality is that many people are finding that their mental health challenges create on-going difficulties for themselves and their families in their day-to-day living. In order to effectively respond to these challenges, governments and industry groups are recognising the importance of funding mental health support service to both address these challenges and to educate the community in an attempt to reduce the stigma traditionally associated with mental health. Considering this unprecedented increase in the numbers of adults, adolescents and children experiencing mental health issue, it is foreseeable that many of the clients counsellors see may have a mental health issue/s, even if it is not the presenting issue. Therefore, in this unit, the student will have the opportunity to examine traditional and contemporary theories related to addressing mental health challenges. They will also be equipped with the skills to recognise mental health issues, and know how to respond appropriately to those issues within the limits of counsellor training and when referral to another mental health professional is warranted.		

Prescribed text(s)	Further to this, the student will have the opportunity to evaluate the strength-based philosophies being utilised by those in the mental health sectors as well as examining factors that threaten mental health from a variety of different perspectives, including neurobiology, psychology, traditional medical models and evidence-based practices, multicultural understandings, postmodernism, and a Christian worldview perspective. Other important factors, including the Australian mental health care system will also be examined. The goal of this master's level unit is to enable students to establish a framework for working with clients facing mental health challenges.
