Rationale	This unit focuses on student self-expression in writing and complements other units in the area of literature by offering students the opportunity to explore literary concepts in a practical, experimental way through the creation of their own writing projects. It provides them with the basic skills required to be creative writers, and the chance to hone their writing skills through workshop exercises, readings and discussions. The development of this creative capacity to write is seen as a means of exploring and enhancing the imago dei (image of God) within them. One of the key ways in which God has revealed himself to humanity is through the written word, including creative genres; thus creative writing is an important area of Christian endeavour as writers seek to express their worldview through text and provide an alternative to the increasing despair of much modern literature. 'Creative writing' as a genre is composed of both the process and the end-product and involves the literary genres of fiction (short stories and novels), poetry, and drama (for stage, film or TV). It refers to any original writing that contains no plagiarism. Through the close reading of the literary texts of other writers and guided experimentation within the three major literary genres, students will examine, explore and discuss the creative process. This will lead to the production of their own various creative texts.
