



Norma Packer Scholarship

The Norma Packer Scholarship will be awarded in 2021 to an Australia citizen or permanent resident who is completing Year 12 in 2020 and who comes from outside of the Brisbane region to undertake full-time study in the Bachelor of Arts in the Liberal Arts.

This competitive scholarship is valued at \$10,000 and will be paid towards the first semester's tuition fees. The remaining balance will be awarded as a cash payment following the semester census date to support the purchase of study resources.



We understand that deciding to study is a huge decision to make and one that requires a lot of thought! Here are just some of the frequently asked questions we get asked every day.

What if I don't get the ATAR I hoped for?

We have pathways for entry to each of our undergraduate courses. No need to be disheartened – simply contact the Admissions staff at admissions@chc.edu.au.

Will you recognise my work experience or previous study?

Absolutely! We want to celebrate and acknowledge your prior learning and are happy to review your transcripts once you apply. For more information, email **study@chc.edu.au**.

Can I try before I buy?

After you enrol in a course and commence a semester, there is a period of time during which you can engage in your studies (either on campus or online, depending on your mode of study), have access to learning materials and get feedback from lecturers before you decide if you want to continue in your course.

Each semester has an advertised census date before which you can change your enrolment without financial or academic penalty. For more information, **contact study@chc.edu.au**.

What are my payment options?

Eligible students are able to defer some or all of their tuition fees through the Commonwealth government's Higher Education Loans Program (HELP). These are loans that are repaid through the tax system once you begin earning above the repayment threshold. Students who are not eligible for HELP must pay their fees upfront.



If you are enrolled in on campus units, you will have normally have three hours of classes per week for each of those units. If you are a full-time student who is doing four units, this means 12 hours of classes per week. These hours are normally scheduled across three or four days, but this can change from semester to semester.

Some on campus units are held as intensives, where the class contact time is concentrated into a number of whole days that are held in two sessions, normally between Thursday and Saturday.

If you are enrolled in external/online units, there are no scheduled classes, although there might be virtual classes that you have to attend.

All of the scheduling arrangements that apply to classes are published on the CHC Timetable before the semester commences, so you can know well in advance what your study commitments will be.

APPLYING TO CHC

Whether you are a recent school leaver (in the past 2 years) or have a Vocational Education and Training (VET) qualification, prior higher education study or work and life experience, CHC has pathways that will enable you to enter many of our courses.

Admission Criteria

To gain admission to a course at CHC, you need to meet minimum standards in each of the following **standard admission criteria** that apply to all courses in the respective categories:

- age (undergraduate courses only)
- academic qualifications (undergraduate and postgraduate courses)
- English language proficiency (undergraduate and postgraduate courses)

The minimum standards you must meet for each of these criteria are provided below.

Age

To be eligible for admission to an undergraduate course, you must be aged at least 17 years if you are a domestic student, and at least 18 years if you are an international student.

Academic Qualifications

Undergraduate courses

The normal minimum academic qualification for admission to undergraduate courses at CHC is the completion of Year 12. Alternatively, you may meet this requirement by having at least a completed VET Certificate III (with a GPA of at least 4.0 for a graded Certificate) or by having completed higher education study of at least one semester (full-time equivalent). Applicants with work and life experience who demonstrate readiness for higher education, including successful completion

of the Special Tertiary Admission Test (STAT) as administered by QTAC, are also eligible for admission to undergraduate courses at CHC.

Postgraduate courses

The normal minimum academic qualification for admission to postgraduate courses at CHC is the completion of an undergraduate degree. Depending upon the nature of the postgraduate course, the undergraduate degree might or might not need to be in a field that is related to the postgraduate course. The requirements as they apply to each course are provided in the course entries on the relevant pages of this Guide.

English Language Proficiency

All courses at CHC have English language proficiency requirements that apply regardless of whether you are an Australian citizen or resident, or your country of birth.

To meet the English language proficiency requirements for courses other than the undergraduate Education courses and the Master of Teaching courses, you must demonstrate that:

- for undergraduate courses, your secondary schooling, or higher education studies of at least one year (full-time equivalent), was conducted in the English language, or
- for postgraduate courses, your undergraduate degree was conducted in the English language, or
- you have achieved at least the minimum standard of results in an acceptable English Language Proficiency examination (see table below), the results for which are no more than two years old as at the commencement of your course.

For the undergraduate courses in Education and the Master of Teaching courses, you must demonstrate that:

- your first language is English, or
- you have satisfactorily completed, within the
 past five years, senior secondary or accredited
 higher education studies of at least two years
 (full-time equivalent) in Australia, New Zealand,
 the United Kingdom, the Republic of Ireland,
 the United States of America or Canada
 (excluding Quebec),
- you have achieved at least the minimum standard of results in an acceptable English Language Proficiency examination (see table below), the results for which are no more than two years old as at the commencement of your course.

The ISLPR test will only be accepted if it has been administered by ISLPR Language Services, Mt Gravatt, Queensland.

Some courses have additional admission criteria, as follows:

- subject prerequisites (undergraduate courses only)
- personal suitability (undergraduate and postgraduate courses)
- professional experience (postgraduate courses only)

The minimum standards you must meet for these criteria differ between courses. Where they are required, they are provided in the course entries on

the relevant pages of this Guide.

The additional admission criteria are explained below. For more detailed information, see the relevant course pages on the CHC website.

Subject Prerequisites

Some undergraduate courses have subject prerequisites (or accepted alternatives) that you must have completed to be eligible for admission. These requirements apply to courses in Education, for which you are expected to have a basic level of knowledge that is provided by completion of the subject prerequisites.

Personal Suitability

Some courses have personal suitability requirements that you must meet to be eligible for admission. These requirements apply to particular courses in Counselling, Education and Ministry where, as a professional, you need to demonstrate certain attributes and qualities that uphold the ethical requirements of those professions.

These requirements also apply to courses in the Liberal Arts, for which you need to demonstrate certain aptitudes and approaches to learning. In each case, you will be asked to demonstrate your meeting of personal suitability requirements through means such as interviews, personal statements and/or referee reports. For some courses, eligibility for a blue card, or similar working with children check, might be required.

Professional Experience

Some postgraduate courses require that you have previous or current professional experience requirements that you must meet to be eligible for admission.

These requirements apply to particular courses in Business, Education and Ministry in order that you have a relevant context upon which you can reflect and to which you can apply your learning. The requirements as stated in the course entries are full-time equivalent (FTE).

Assumed Knowledge

Except where noted, if you are admitted to an undergraduate course at CHC, it is assumed that you have knowledge that is equivalent to having achieved a passing exit grade in Year 12 English.

For students completing Year 12 in 2020, this is equivalent to having completed Units 3 and 4, with an exit grade of C, in one of the following QCAA subjects: English Literature, English and Literature Extension; English as an Additional Language.

ATAR

Unlike larger providers in which quotas might restrict the number of applicants that can be admitted, CHC does not apply strict minimum ATARs to its undergraduate courses.

Instead, CHC takes a more holistic approach to admission which means that, if you do not get the recommended minimum ATAR for the course of your choice, you might still be offered a place in the course if you can demonstrate through other means that you are likely to succeed in the course. For the recommended minimum ATARs for CHC undergraduate courses, see the course entries on the relevant pages of this Guide. The recommended minimum ATAR for a course can vary from year to year.

Course Entries

For an explanation of the information that is included in the course entries that appear on the preceding pages of this Guide, please see the table below. The information that is contained in each course entry will be included as applicable.

Information included in Course Entries

INFORMATION	EXPLANATION
Course Name	The name of the course of study.
CHC Code	The CHC code allocated to the course of study.
QTAC Code (as applicable)	The code allocated to courses for which application is made through QTAC.
Course Duration	The number of years of full-time (F) and part-time (P) study required to complete the course (full-time = 4 units per semester; part-time = 2 units per semester). For postgraduate Business courses, this is the number of study periods (SP) required to complete the course at the rate of 1 unit per study period (3 study periods = 1 semester; 6 study periods = 2 semesters).
Entry Requirements	The minimum requirements that must be met against the admission criteria for the course. Where the course entry includes reference to standard admission criteria, the relevant requirements as stated above will apply. For postgraduate courses, the required academic qualifications will be provided. Where the course entry includes reference to additional admission criteria, these will be provided as applicable to the course. Some courses have alternative entry requirements that applicants can meet if they do not meet the standard academic admission criterion for the course (other standard admission criteria and any additional admission criteria must also be met).
Assumed Knowledge	The assumed knowledge for the course (undergraduate courses only), if different to the statement above.
