<b>Rationale</b>	<p>This unit provides a foundation for the understanding and application of research design and methodology within the Social Sciences. The unit introduces students to the field of research and develops skills in reading, understanding, and evaluating research from different epistemological paradigms. Students will investigate what constitutes valid, useful, and reliable research design and methodology, and will explore a range of design methods within quantitative and qualitative frameworks. Students will also investigate the processes and procedures that underpin a range of research orientations. The ethical considerations that impact upon all forms of research will also be critiqued and investigated from a Christian perspective.</p> <p>This unit will provide an opportunity to link research theory with current practice in a relevant and meaningful manner. Through this critique, students will apply their understandings of valid and reliable research design and methodology to specific research that has been reported through journal articles.</p>
