The cutting edge of youth work: How to remain informed of issues through media, networking, and other sources **Learning outcomes** On completion of this unit, students will have demonstrated that they have: 1. integrated biblical and theological principles related to effective youth work practice; 2. analysed theoretical perspectives and the evidence-base relating to a range of current and emerging issues experienced by contemporary young people; 3. critically evaluated skills relating to effective practice with diverse groups of young people experiencing a range of current and emerging issues; 4. applied knowledge and skills related to current and emerging 'youth' issues in their practice with young people; 5. critically integrated learning into their developing approach to youth work practice; and 6. communicated at an appropriate tertiary standard with special attention to correct grammars, punctuation, spelling, vocabulary, usage, sentence structure, logical relations, style, referencing, and presentation.

Assessment tasks Task 1: Question and Response Respond to four out of six possible online forum questions. Word Length/Duration: 1,600 words (4 x 400 words) Weighting: 30% **Learning Outcomes:** 1-3, 5, 6 Assessed: Weeks 3, 5, 7, 9, 11, 13 Task 2: Group Seminar Students will be divided into small groups of two or three for the purpose of preparing and presenting group seminars during weekly tutorials. Word Length/Duration: 30 minutes Weighting: 35% **Learning Outcomes:** 1-4, 6 Assessed: Weekly in tutorials Task 3: Case Study Students will construct a case study concerning a young person (or group of young people) experiencing an issue (or issues) discussed in this unit. Word Length/Duration: 1,750 words Weighting: 35% **Learning Outcomes:** 2-6 Assessed: Week 13
